

The Tudor Revival of the 20th century (also called Mock Tudor or Tudorbethan Style), is an outgrowth of the Queen Anne style and is favored for its storybook charm and design versatility. Tudor Revival style was popular in many areas of the US from 1915 to about 1940 and was used on small houses and grand medieval manors. Tudor Revival and its cousin, the English Cottage, continue to be extremely popular and still influence contemporary American architecture. Features of Tudor Revival include:

- Decorative half-timbering
- Steeplly pitched roof
- Prominent cross gables
- Tall, narrow windows
- Small window panes
- Massive chimneys, often topped with decorative chimney pots
